



Regional Triathlon

It was a fantastic day arriving at Rabbit Island for the 2014 Regional Triathlon. We had both experienced and new members in our team this year. Twelve students strong, with five year 9 students. The team had trained hard and were always a pleasure to work with. The juniors performed very well but just outside the places, Samantha Ashley getting 4th in the U14 and Ben Price getting 4th in the boys race. Was Samantha is actually U13 meaning she can complete in the same grade next year making her inaugural event even more impressive. Ben was just pipped near the finish line by two competitors giving hope for an improved outcome next year. In the U16 grade Thomas Heaton used his great speed in the water to gain a second place while Olivia Wilbourne and Poppy Restieaux achieved 4th and 5th, again little separating them from the competitors just in front.

Our best results were achieved by our most experienced athletes in the U19 grade. The distance for these competitors was a 750m swim, 25km ride and a 5km run. Sam Traynor looked very strong to just beat fellow Garin student Sam Harrison for 3rd. Both were about 15 seconds from the 2nd place getter. But Amy proved our strongest competitor placing 1st easily beating all others in the senior girls race. The rest of the team included Claudia Leonard,

Frank Quin, Kate McCashin and Quinn Chisholm all equipping themselves well. It was a great effort by all. If other students wish to join Triathlon it will be restarting again in Term 4. Students join the team for a number of reasons including ;off-season fitness for other sports;, they love competing in Triathlon; and others to win in a sport that they excel in.

Garin acquitted themselves well placing 2nd overall even though we had about half the number of competitors compared to the big schools.

... from the Head Teacher John Boyce



Two days ago we had Ash Wednesday and the Church's liturgy to mark the beginning of Lent as we prepare for Easter.

I am very aware that many of our students (and a few of our parents) have not taken a regular part in these liturgies - and so maybe haven't ever thought much about this sequence of events in the Catholic year.

The events began with Shrove Tuesday - or as it is called in many parts of the world, "Fat Tuesday" which translates into French as *Mardi Gras* (so in New Orleans they got out and celebrated despite the miserable autumn weather).

Shrove Tuesday is the last day before fasting (which used to be taken very seriously throughout the Christian world). On Shrove Tuesday Christians could eat all sorts of rich food for the last time before the 40 days until Easter.

RE teacher April Williams even organised a traditional pancake race to raise money for Relay for Life.

Wednesday is the first day of the 40 day Lenten period, and we marked it with the ashes ceremony where everyone had their foreheads marked with an ash cross to remind us that we are mortal people on a journey of self-discover and self-improvement.

Over the rest of the term we will have events that enable students to take part in a programme of self-awareness of our place in the world.

That will involve self-denial, helping others, and prayer. For instance, all three will be very apparent in the Slum City event at the end of the month.

Lent finishes right at the end of the term with the celebration of Easter where we remember that at heart we are all also spiritual beings, and the resurrection of Jesus helps us understand that death is just one phase in a much longer life.

Career planning for all students

During the remainder of term one students from year 9 to 13 are working on-line with their career planning via DreamCatcher.

Goal-Setting - Students are also working on setting an academic goal per subject (as well as a career goal and a personal goal or two) and enter these into DreamCatcher. There is a "create task" feature for each goal and it is this step by step approach to goal setting that will enhance success in achieving each goal.

Career ideas and Career research - After an initial lesson in classes, these features in DreamCatcher are self managed by students and they are encouraged to "project manage" their own career research using the DreamCatcher tool.

Log-in at home - we apologise that currently we don't have the parent login passwords for DreamCatcher, however, we are encouraging students to login at home with their own password and discuss their career planning progress with you.

Parent log-in facilities will be advised in the very near future.
